

SOEC ADVISORY COMMITTEE ENDORSEMENT

The SOEC advisory committee was established to provide the City of Penticton some oversight regarding the SOEC operations including items such as budget and proposed events throughout the year. The role is not to micro-manage the operations, but to provide commentary and suggestions. We have reviewed the proposed 2022 budget with Dean Clarke and provide the following comments;

- 2021 was the first year SOEC did not host concerts. In the 2021 budget, it was expected events would start by the 3rd quarter of 2021. This did not happen and the 1st quarter in 2022 is also expected to be slow, although there are 3 events planned, a much lower number compared to pre-Covid.
- The challenges with COVID have been enormous since the spring of 2020 which has had a significant negative impact on operations. Unfortunately, this will continue to impact 2022 financial projections. In 2021, the uncertainty regarding changing health advisories presented a challenge to book events in addition to gaining customer confidence. The decision to restrict capacities to 50% in the Interior Health region (vs 100% allowance in lower mainland) has made it difficult to plan for many events in the 1rst quarter of 2022. As well. operating at 50% capacity still requires 100% of square footage to be maintained. It is important to note that sufficient lead time is required to book events. As such, as we are nearing the end of 2021, this continuing challenge of only 50% capacity has resulted in additional negative impact to the 1st quarter of 2022. There are 3 events scheduled in 1rst quarter of 2022, however, they are at risk if the 50% capacity limitation is not eliminated.
- Inflation continues to negatively impact costs, especially in the area of food, but also general supplies and other areas. It is apparent from the first few Penticton Vees games this season, there have been many no-shows which negatively affect concession sales and increase spoilage costs. This may continue into 2022.
- There are also increased costs in staff retention and attraction. There is a significant challenge in attracting staff, similar to other service businesses in Penticton, and with limited events planned, the problem of retaining staff will probably continue into 2022

In summary, we are in agreement with the 2022 budget of (2,118,103) being presented. However, it should be noted the continuing capacity restrictions may negatively impact operations beyond the 1st quarter. Customer and promoter confidence is low and time will be needed to return to pre-Covid financial results.



SOEC Complex Challenges




- Attaining/retaining qualified employees
- Minimum wage increases
- 50% capacity restrictions and the uncertainty of when 100% capacity will return
- 44% of Penticton Vees season ticket holders do not attend/use tickets for every game
- Increase in cleaning, building, and housekeeping expenses
- Creating and implementing safety policies/procedures with ever-changing regulations
- Increase in food & beverage costs (ie. beef up 40%, fries up 14%, fryer oil up 64%, chicken up 28%)

SOEC COMPLEX HISTORICAL AND FUTURE CITY FUNDING TREND

The efficiency of event performance has impacted the overall financials positively, however, the rising cost of part-time labour, employer health tax, liability insurance and repairs and maintenance of all buildings has impacted the overall financials negatively, therefore, these items are budgeted appropriately for 2021.




 CURRENT PROJECTION OF CITY FUNDING






